At the beginning of last year, I found myself on a yoga mat in our local gym, next to a fellow Pilates student, Brigitta, who explained that she was a soprano in the Liverpool Welsh Choral. We found that we shared a passion for music but from different histories and perspectives. By coincidence I met one of the tenors, Ann, a friend of a friend, and before long I was persuaded to attend a striking and beautiful Liverpool Welsh Choral concert at the Philharmonic Hall: I was extremely impressed! Although very unsure whether I could dust off my rusty teenage and early twenties' musicianship, I joined an initial "live" (as opposed to "virtual") choir practice in All Hallows Church.



At first, I found the pace of rehearsal extremely challenging. The sheer number of singers was also a bit overwhelming. However, thanks to Keith's inspiration, combined with the support of my new colleagues and our trusty section leader, Mo, I passed (a bit miraculously) my audition and was able to join in that extraordinary and uplifting concert, "Great Choral Classics" last November: a moving triumph for everyone as we heralded the first stage of recovery from the pandemic.

This has been a wonderful opportunity and I am very grateful to those who have helped me to persevere, finding my listening, singing and watching skills slowly improving. It is truly a privilege to be a member of such a talented, motivated and experienced choir. Sadly, I may have to absent myself from rehearsals for a while because of home circumstances, but I shall be back.

It all started two years earlier when the response to my proposal for another trip abroad met with great enthusiasm. As we had no contacts in Prague to facilitate arrangements we worked with a tour consultant called 'acfea'. There was time to plan and link our concert programme in early May 2014 with a concert called '*Prelude to Prague'*. We agreed with acfea that they would be responsible for booking flights, a hotel, concert venues following consultation and a tour of the city. Chris Williamson, who kindly edited these reminiscences, offered to help. Sarah Pumfrey, our treasurer, dealt with the financial side. The choir numbered about 120 at the time. We could not offer financial assistance, so only those who could find the time and financial commitment, plus 'groupies', made up the party. We were relieved to end with a well-balanced SATB choir. Few problems arose, except an unanticipated rise in air fares and agreeing the correct Czech pronunciation.

We took the same programme to two churches: The Church of the Holy Saviour in the centre of Prague and The Church of St John the Baptist at Treplice, about 80 kms north of the city. We were performing a very varied programme, clearly popular in Prague, for our church was full with an enthusiastic audience. LWC responded admirably. It was a pleasant occasion although unfortunately a member of the audience collapsed before we started. An LWC nurse was on hand and the patient recovered. The Treplice concert really sticks in my mind. I have never heard the choir in better voice. The Welsh National Anthem raised the roof. We performed works by Vaughan-Williams, Mathias, Elgar, Handel and Rutter. The performance of Dvorak, the sign language in the Chilcott—these created a real buzz in the audience... Stephen and Keith were inspired and we ended with a prolonged standing ovation.

Apart from the concerts, we had a tour of the city when the good weather suddenly turned into a downpour, driving a number of us into the local hostelry. There was a coach trip to Olecni Dum (Prague's Municipal House), a dinner while cruising on the Vltava River and of course time to wander as we wished. On the final night, we persuaded another choir in our hotel to join us in after-dinner singing, memorable for the decibels. It was a fine visit packed with interest and much inspirational singing. Such times are not only a joy to those able to take part but also a morale booster to the choir in general. Surely such visits make the choir more attractive and help with recruitment. Maybe it is time to think about another chance to sing abroad!!
