Singing with LWC is good for your health - REALLY!



Whether you call them resolutions, intentions, or a load of hogwash, it's that time of year again. We all know that health is a common topic after Christmas, and I've got great news: singing with the Liverpool Welsh Choral is really good for you!

Sure, putting on a solo concert in the shower is fun, but singing in a choir boosts wellbeing, enhances self-esteem, reduces anxiety and depression, and improves the connections we have with other people. A large-scale survey of choral singers* in Britain, Australia and Germany identified six benefits of choral singing.

With how many of these would you agree?

Social benefits:

Choir singing helps us create and maintain social networks, gives us a sense of belonging, and makes us feel included and appreciated.

Physical benefits:

Singing is a full-body activity, and choristers said it supported their respiratory, vocal, and cardiovascular health, and motivated them to improve their mobility and stamina. Singing can also be a welcome distraction from poor health, reducing the body's stress response and providing relief.

Mood benefits:

Singing makes us happy! It can provide an outlet for self-expression and can be cathartic, calming, energising, and even spiritual.

Cognitive benefits:

Choral singing can improve concentration and memory by giving your brain a workout, especially during rehearsals. Challenging yourself through singing can also provide a sense of balance in your life.

Skill-building:

Learning about music and developing competence is an enjoyable and never-ending project, and singing is a unique experience that enhances the deep joy we find in music.

Providing meaning and purpose:

Singing with a choir introduces discipline and structure into our lives and helps us feel like we're part of something meaningful and rewarding. It gives us something to look forward to, which other researchers have found especially beneficial for older adults, people with health concerns, and carers.

So there you have it: one of the best things you can do for your health in 2023 is continue to sing with the Liverpool Welsh Choral! If you know someone who wants to focus on health this year, why not invite them to join us?

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

MEET - our Community Liaison Team!



Pam Donaghy, Margaret Heap, Annabelle Unsworth and Wena Evans are the members of Liverpool Welsh Choral's Community Liaison Team whose role it is to promote our Choir in the communities of the Liverpool area. Find out a little bit more about them and the wonderful work they do....

During 2021 we made contact with Strawberry Fields which gained worldwide fame following the release of the Beatles 1967 single "Strawberry Fields Forever." John Lennon had grown up nearby, and had played in the grounds there as a child, which was formerly the site of the Salvation Army children's home. It was arranged that a group of our choir would sing there at a Christmas lunch in December 2021. However due to the number of Covid cases at that time, the venue cancelled at short notice, much to the disappointment of those who were going to sing.

The Liaison team kept in contact with the management and we rescheduled to sing on December 13th 2022 at a special Christmas meal which was taking place on that day. This was a very enjoyable occasion, and we had some very positive feedback from all who were listening including some of the cast of 'A White Christmas' who were performing at the Empire theatre in Liverpool and had come to visit the venue. The most noteworthy audience members were 'Sinbad' from Brookside and Judy Garland's daughter Lorna Luft!!

Prior to that, on the weekend of Saturday 3rd and Sunday 4th December 2022, a group from LWC sang at Sudley House in Aigburth at their open Christmas weekend. Sudley House, built in 1824 and owned by the shipping line owner George Holt, was bequeathed to the city of Liverpool by his daughter in 1944. It is now a museum and art gallery and is one of the few period homes still decorated in its original Victorian style. The Choir sang carols from the upstairs balcony and members of the public listened as they passed through.

The Liaison Team are now arranging things to promote the choir in 2023. Hopefully our next event will be leading the singing as part of a congregation for the Battle of the Atlantic in May, although this is still to be finalised!

To see the supertonic prolonged over five.


An octave is offering this simple phrase,

Wena Evans - Cadeirydd

In 1972, I, like many youngsters from Wales, came to Liverpool to start my nurse training. I worked in the old (old) Royal and then The Southern Hospital (now well gone). I completed my Midwifery at Oxford Street and a few months later went to work in Thailand as a nurse/midwife for VSO, a most enlightening experience!

I returned in 1989 to become a District Nurse, working for GPs on Aigburth Road and Toxteth. I loved it! I married Tim in 1980 and we had three lovely children. Tim has done much to help, uncomplainingly, with our concerts over the years.

By the time we were a family, I had become involved with the National Childbirth Trust, running preparation courses for pregnant couples. When I retired early from the NHS as an Area Manager, I became a national educator for NCT, with a group in Liverpool and another in Northern Ireland. I retired from NCT in 2018.

Musically, I was a singer. Our school in Colwyn Bay entered the Eisteddfods, gave concerts, and I was always involved. I heard about the Liverpool Welsh Choir whilst at the Welsh Church in Liverpool and joined in 1999/2000. A group of second sopranos took me under their wing. It was nourishing to be part of a Welsh community again! The women sat knitting, marking, writing whilst the rehearsals were going on and I was amazed that they could concentrate also on the conductor's remarks. I could not possibly countenance such behaviour now I am Chair!!

I was greatly honoured to be Cadeirydd between 2011 and 2014, and it is wonderful to embrace the new season, again in the Chair. We have an evolving Choir and an exhilarating new programme to look forward to, with very talented direction. I am most grateful for the support of Tim, my family and friends and I hope to continue singing with our choir and supporting it for many years to come.
