Hi, my name is Andrew Bailey and I've been a bass with LWC for 14 years. What's the saying? Time flies when you're having fun and what an enjoyable 14 years they've been!

My choral singing 'journey' started at a young age. My parents both sang with the local Wolverhampton Civic Choir and music and the choir, formed the backdrop to my childhood. I learned to the play the piano from the age of 7 and always enjoyed singing at school. Once I'd found my bass voice, Mum encouraged me to join the Civic Choir. I loved the experience and learned a lot during a short time.

I left home for Liverpool University in 2000 to study Architecture, my other great passion! I quickly joined the University choir and within the first term I had performed both the *Faure* and *Mozart Requiem*, no mean feat! Over the coming years I sang as often as time allowed, but ultimately singing took a back seat to the all-consuming demands of studying Architecture and student life in general.

Only after completing my training and qualifying as an Architect in 2008 (and finding myself with actual spare time!) did my desire for singing re-ignite. Via a chance family connection to George Jones, our librarian, I ended up auditioning for LWC and the rest is history. I've had the privilege to perform in some fantastic concerts over the years. There are far too many to mention but particularly memorable highlights have included the spectacular Titanic Experience at the Anglican Cathedral and a joint performance of *Carmina Burana* with Birmingham Festival Chorus.

Singing remains a great pleasure for me and whilst it's sometimes, if not always, a struggle for me to get to choir rehearsals on time from work in Manchester (where I'm currently busy with the Manchester Town Hall project), it's worth the effort. It's a great way to unwind after a taxing day and a distraction from life's woes...


Wasn't our Coronation sing splendid?? Yes, the following Saturday in the Abbey was pretty good, but didn't we have a smashing time that Wednesday evening!

Meet our Membership Faculty

LWC is a marvellous entity. We turn up, week after week to join in glorious song; we practise hard to make perfect; we present the result of our labours to a discerning audience: and it all happens by magic!! Publicity organised. Tick! Orchestra and soloists turn up. Tick! Choir needs catered for. Tick! In reality a lot of hard planning and meticulous work goes on behind the scenes all year long.

In the last edition of *Simply Dynamic!*, the Community Liaison Group was highlighted. This time, it's the turn of **the Membership Faculty**. 'Faculty' seems a grand name for a sub-committee, but it was chosen to indicate a grouping of groups. Before Lockdown, each small group worked separately and came together in huge meetings that went on for hours, repeating much of the work. Geraldine and Stella made use of the enforced pause to streamline the process, bringing each group into one of four Faculties, which work semi-autonomously. The Faculty Leader reports to the Executive Committee to finalise decisions. A streamlined organisation makes it so much easier for everyone to contribute.

The Membership Faculty deals with attendance, recruitment, data protection, uniform and platform/stage management. Our members at the moment are: Angela Case, the Membership Secretary; Stella McGann, recruitment and GDPR and Sheila Hamilton, who deals with Choir Uniform, not-so-ordinary members Alison Shead, Anne Williams and Ioan Wardhaugh and of course, our indispensable Choir Adminstrator, Laura McGuffe. The Faculty basically handles all matters which in any way affect the choir membership, from a prospective new member's initial enquiry, through their first audition, their first concert, right through to congratulating them on landmark years of service! In fact it is this group who organised the Coronation event!

We hear of choirs all over the country whose numbers are decreasing, causing some to close. However, Liverpool Welsh Choral has been fortunate to see over twenty new members joining. It seems now as though there is rarely a week where there isn't an enquiry, a new face appearing, an audition or a new member being presented with a badge. At our last concert, approximately one third of our singers had joined since our return after lockdown. We're continually advertising for new members and planning ways to bring people in. The attendance register, under the eagle eye of Angela is now kept electronically and this helps us keep all our information together, so that we can track the number of voices in each section, and their eligibility for concerts. Angela is of course also our platform manager, whose seemingly unflappable nature gets us all seated in the right place for our concerts - and aren't we looking just splendid on the photos of our recent Tung appearances?

The Chinese Youth Orchestra

- and the Pagoda



All those choir members who took part in the Spirit of Liverpool Concert in 2018 were astounded by the skill and enthusiasm of the Chinese Youth Orchestra, who joined us. Many of the instruments were strange to us, but the sounds they produced were haunting and unforgettable. The struggle to learn the Chinese words was all worthwhile as we were entranced by our accompaniment.

The good news is that this wonderful orchestra is to join us again on 21st October in the Tung Auditorium.

The bad news is that the place where this orchestra practises, the Chinese Cultural Centre - the Pagoda, is about to be closed in cost-cutting measures implemented by the Council. Many community organisations use the 40-year-old centre and its closure would be a huge loss to the area. Liverpool has the oldest and one of the largest community of people of Chinese heritage in Europe. Its links to the City and to the University are very strong. The Tung Auditorium itself was named after a Chinese benefactor.





Many people, including the MP and local Councillor, have argued for its continuance, but unless a regular source of income is found, the site may fall victim to development. The BBC Singers managed to get a reprieve. Let's hope something similar will happen for the Pagoda.

John Dowland was a lutenist, and most of the music he composed was for the lute, or lute and voice. The lute, or similar instruments, probably originated about 5,000 years ago and was widespread through much of the ancient world, especially in the Middle East. The Arab conquest of Spain introduced it into Europe and the instrument was adopted by the Provencal troubadours (trouveres).

6. What celebrated musician also has a PhD in astrophysics, is a CBE, a knight and was Chancellor of John Moores University between 2008 and 2013?

Brian May of Queen. Recently knighted by King Charles.




